I have lived in Colac for over 60 years and during that time have been involved in many community organisations, including the Lough Calvert Drainage Trust, a Lake Colac Consultative Committee, The Infant Welfare Committee and the Colac and District Historical Society. It is my experience with thee bodies as well as my long residence in the district which brings me to object to the proposed re-distribution of electoral boundaries which places Colac in the proposed new electorate of Cox. I will voice my objections particularly from my background of historical research. Since the earliest days of settlement Colac residents and organisations have had much closer interactions with the Geelong area rather than with the area to the west, proposed as the newly named Cox. The Stony Rises, between Colac and Camperdown, for over a century, proved an effective barrier to easy comma actions and interactions between Colac residents and the west of the state. The management of our water supply now rests with Barwon Water. Our tourism industry has had historical links with Geelong bodies. The long distances involved in travel have acted against our Historical Society taking a strong role in the association of societies covering the west and north-west of the state, while there are many more reasons for our society to interact with the Geelong based regional historical bodies. Many historical records relating to Colac have been held by the Geelong Heritage Centre. The Geelong and District Historical Website includes Colac and has a host of Colac, including cemetery records and other publications related to the area. Indeed the Cemetery in Colac is managed by the Geelong Cemetery Trust. As an historical researcher I have found that many Colac residents over the years have had business relationships with Geelong, have retired to Geelong, have supported Geelong schools and charities. Currently the links with Geelong health services are constant and strong.
