Executive summary

This report outlines the augmented Electoral Commission for Victoria's (the augmented Electoral Commission's) redistribution of Victoria into 39 electoral divisions.

The name and boundaries of the new Division of Hawke, in recognition of the former Prime Minister, the Hon. Robert James Lee Hawke AC (1929–2019), have been unanimously adopted.

One modification has been made to the Redistribution Committee for Victoria's (the Redistribution Committee's) proposed redistribution with respect to the names of electoral divisions. The name of the Division of Corangamite has been retained.

The names of the remaining 37 electoral divisions have been retained by the augmented Electoral Commission.

The augmented Electoral Commission has adopted all of the boundaries of electoral divisions proposed by the Redistribution Committee with the following modifications:

- Cranbourne and Glasscocks Roads have been adopted as the south-eastern boundary for the Division of Bruce
- the portion of Berwick located south of Greaves Road and west of Clyde Road is located in the Division of Bruce and the portion located to the east of Harkaway Road and north of High Street/ Princes Highway is located in the Division of La Trobe
- the part of the locality of Burwood East bounded by Burwood Highway, Blackburn Road, Hawthorn Road and Mahoneys Road is located in the Division of Chisholm, uniting the locality in the one electoral division
- the entirety of the localities of Hesse and Inverleigh, and part of the locality of Wingeel, are located in the Division of Corangamite
- the majority of the locality of Windsor has been transferred to the Division of Higgins
- the localities of Clyde and Tooradin are retained in the Division of Holt
- the residential part of the locality of Lyndhurst, bounded by Western Port Highway, Thompsons Road and the Cranbourne rail line, is retained in the Division of Holt
- the part of the locality of Oakleigh East bounded by the Princes Highway, Ferntree Gully Road and Clayton Road is located in the Division of Hotham, uniting the locality in the one electoral division
- the part of the locality of Dandenong, located to the south of the Pakenham-Cranbourne rail line and bounded by Eastlink, the Dandenong Bypass and the South Gippsland Highway, is located in the Division of Isaacs
- the portion of the locality of Surrey Hills bounded by Riversdale Road, Elgar Road, Canterbury Road and Warrigal Road is now located in the Division of Kooyong, uniting the locality in the one electoral division
- the portion of the locality of Harkaway to the east of Harkaway Road is located in the Division of La Trobe
- the entirety of the localities of Caulfield, Caulfield East and Caulfield North, together with that portion of the locality of St Kilda East located to the east of Hotham Street and those portions of the localities of Elsternwick and Glen Huntly located to the north of Glen Huntly Road are retained in the Division of Macnamara
- a small number of minor alterations, involving little or no elector movement, to adhere to features or administrative boundaries.

Background

A redistribution of electoral divisions is the process where electoral divisions and their names and boundaries are reviewed, and may be altered, to ensure, as near as practicable:

- each state and territory gains representation in the House of Representatives in proportion to the population of the state or territory, and
- there are a similar number of electors in each electoral division for a given state or territory.

The *Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918* (the Electoral Act) makes provision for the conduct of redistributions, including procedures, processes and timelines to be followed and how and when public consultation is to occur.

A redistribution of electoral divisions in Victoria was required as the number of members of the House of Representatives that is to be chosen for Victoria at the next general election has increased from 38 to 39.

The redistribution process commenced with a direction from the Electoral Commission on Wednesday 15 July 2020.

The Redistribution Committee released its proposed redistribution on Friday 19 March 2021. Interested individuals and organisations were invited to make written objections on the proposed redistribution and written comments on objections via notices published in:

- the *Commonwealth Government Notices Gazette* (the Gazette) on Friday 19 March 2021,
- *The Age*, *The Herald Sun* and *The Weekend Australian* on Saturday 27 March 2021,
- *Weekly Times* on Wednesday 31 March 2021,
- *Koori Mail* on Wednesday 7 April 2021, and
- 10 regional newspapers

Sixty-seven objections to the proposed redistribution were made available for public perusal on Monday 19 April 2021 and 53 comments on objections were made available from Monday 3 May 2021. An online inquiry into objections was held for video and audio participants with:

- 20 submissions made on Monday 7 June 2021, and
- two submissions made on Friday 11 June 2021.

The augmented Electoral Commission found the written submissions made throughout the redistribution process, together with the submissions presented by those participating in the inquiry, to be a valuable contribution and is appreciative of the time and effort expended by all those who contributed. The redistribution has been informed by a thorough consideration of these submissions and the augmented Electoral Commission has taken them into account in making its determination. However, the augmented Electoral Commission felt unable to implement some aspects of these submissions for the reasons set out in Chapter 2 and Appendix F of this report.

This redistribution complies with all relevant provisions of the Electoral Act.

Legislative requirements

The Electoral Act requires Victoria to be divided into the same number of electoral divisions as the number of members of the House of Representatives to be chosen in Victoria at a general election. As Victoria is entitled to 39 members of the House of Representatives, the augmented Electoral Commission has redistributed Victoria into 39 electoral divisions.

In making its redistribution, the augmented Electoral Commission is required to adhere to two strict numerical requirements imposed by the Electoral Act. These two numerical requirements provide an overall constraint to ensure that there are approximately equal numbers of electors in each electoral division so that each elector in Victoria has equality of representation in the House of Representatives.

All electoral divisions are required to be within the range of plus 10 per cent and minus 10 per cent of the redistribution quota. At the end of Wednesday 15 July 2020, the day on which the redistribution commenced, 4,251,806 electors were enrolled in Victoria. The redistribution quota was therefore 109,021 electors. As the Electoral Act requires electoral divisions to be within the range of plus and minus 10 per cent of this quota, the augmented Electoral Commission was required to construct electoral divisions which contain between 98,119 and 119,923 electors.

All electoral divisions are also required to be within the range of plus 3.5 per cent and minus 3.5 per cent of the projected enrolment quota at the projection time of Sunday 26 January 2025. As the number of electors projected to be enrolled in Victoria at this time is 4,567,191, and the projected enrolment quota is 117,107, the augmented Electoral Commission was required to construct electoral divisions which are projected to contain between 113,009 and 121,205 electors on Sunday 26 January 2025.

In relation to each proposed electoral division, the augmented Electoral Commission is also required by the Electoral Act to give due consideration to:

- i. community of interests within the electoral division, including economic, social and regional interests,
- ii. means of communication and travel within the electoral division,
- iv. the physical features and area of the electoral division, and
- v. the boundaries of existing electoral divisions in Victoria, with this factor being subordinate to the consideration of i, ii and iv.

The augmented Electoral Commission can only balance the different criteria against each other so far as they affect each of the 39 electoral divisions in Victoria and try and achieve the best balance overall. Given the primacy of the two numerical requirements, it is impossible to satisfy all the statutory criteria to the same extent in each electoral division.

Redistribution of Victoria

The redistribution covers:

- where to locate the new electoral division,
- the names of the 39 electoral divisions, and
- where to draw the boundaries between electoral divisions in Victoria to accommodate the new electoral division.

Creation of a new electoral division

The augmented Electoral Commission's consideration of where to locate a new electoral division was guided by the Electoral Act, namely, the numerical requirements and the obligations relating to community of interest, means of communication and travel, the physical features and area of the electoral division and the boundaries of existing electoral divisions.

The Redistribution Committee proposed creating a new electoral division to the north-west of Melbourne to be named 'Hawke' in recognition of the Hon. Robert James Lee Hawke AC (1929–2019), Prime Minister of Australia from 1983 to 1991. The proposed Division of Hawke centred on the localities of Bacchus Marsh, Ballan, Melton, and Sunbury in the local government areas of Hume City, Melton City and Moorabool Shire Councils.

A small number of objections to the proposed redistribution argued:

- for different electoral division boundaries to those proposed by the Redistribution Committee; and
- the new electoral division be given a different name.

The augmented Electoral Commission has unanimously adopted the Redistribution Committee's proposal to create the new Division of Hawke to the north-west of Melbourne. Reasons for doing so are set out in Chapter 2 of this report.

Names of electoral divisions

The Redistribution Committee proposed:

- naming the new electoral division 'Hawke',
- renaming the Division of Corangamite to 'Tucker' in honour of Margaret (Lilardia) Elizabeth Tucker MBE (1904–1996), for her significant work to create a more equal and understanding society for Aboriginal people, and
- retaining the names of 37 of the 38 existing electoral divisions in Victoria.

With respect to the names of electoral divisions, a significant proportion of submissions referred to the names of electoral divisions.

Some of these supported the Redistribution Committee's proposed names, while others argued that electoral divisions should retain the name they had at the commencement of the redistribution or offered a different name for consideration by the augmented Electoral Commission.

A large number of arguments were made advocating retention of the original name 'Corangamite' for the proposed Division of Tucker. The augmented Electoral Commission unanimously concluded it would be appropriate to retain the existing name of 'Corangamite' for the electoral division, which is both a Federation name and an Aboriginal name.

After careful consideration of the arguments to rename the proposed Division of Hawke, the augmented Electoral Commission observed the name was consistent with the 'Guidelines for naming federal electoral divisions' (the guidelines) and should stand unchanged. The new electoral division will be named 'Hawke' to recognise the Hon. Robert James Lee Hawke AC.

The augmented Electoral Commission unanimously agreed the arguments offered in support of altering the names of any of the other 37 proposed electoral divisions were not substantive enough to warrant change from the Redistribution Committee's proposal. These 37 electoral divisions will be known by the names proposed by the Redistribution Committee.

The augmented Electoral Commission's electoral division names have been agreed for the reasons set out in Chapter 2 and Appendix F of this report.

Boundaries of electoral divisions

In determining the boundaries of electoral divisions in a state or territory, the Electoral Act requires the augmented Electoral Commission to ensure the enrolment numbers for each electoral division remain within the two ranges of the permissible maximum and minimum number of electors in an electoral division.

Victoria's entitlement to members of the House of Representatives has increased from 38 to 39 members. As a consequence of inserting an electoral division, the redistribution quota and projected enrolment quota were reduced, as were the ranges for the permissible maximum and minimum number of electors around these quotas. More electoral divisions fell outside these ranges than may otherwise have been the case. The augmented Electoral Commission was required, as was the Redistribution Committee, to alter the electoral division boundaries of 19 of Victoria's electoral divisions to accommodate this and ensure that all electoral divisions met the requirements of the Electoral Act.

The augmented Electoral Commission noted that the Redistribution Committee's proposal met the requirements of the Electoral Act and proposed electoral divisions that can accommodate growth while keeping existing communities of interest together where possible and providing strong and readily identifiable features as boundaries where possible. Further, the augmented Electoral Commission noted the Redistribution Committee's proposal was consistent with the suggestions and comments on suggestions received.

The augmented Electoral Commission noted that the Redistribution Committee's proposal met the requirements of the Electoral Act and proposed electoral divisions which:

- were more equitably balanced numerically across the state,
- could accommodate the differing projected rates of growth across Victoria,
- kept together or improved existing communities of interest, in some cases represented by local government areas and localities, where possible,
- used strong and readily identifiable features, such as major roads, rivers or established administrative boundaries to define electoral division boundaries, and
- were consistent with elements of the 35 suggestions to the redistribution and 21 comments on suggestions which identified electoral boundary changes to meet the numerical requirements of the Electoral Act.

Constructing a new electoral division will, of necessity, result in significant elector movement into the new electoral division and will also require consequential boundary changes and elector movements across the state to ensure that all electoral divisions remain within the two permissible ranges.

The augmented Electoral Commission noted that the Redistribution Committee's proposal met the requirements of the Electoral Act and provided electoral divisions that accommodated future growth while recognising and maintaining communities of interest and using strong boundaries where possible.

The augmented Electoral Commission carefully considered the Redistribution Committee's proposed redistribution, the objections to the proposed redistribution, comments on objections and further information provided in submissions at the inquiry, which was conducted in a virtual environment. The augmented Electoral Commission unanimously agreed with much of what was proposed by the Redistribution Committee but was of the opinion that improvements could be made.

As a number of the changes advocated in objections to the proposed redistribution, comments on objections and submissions to the inquiry were able to be accommodated within the permissible ranges for the number of electors within an electoral division, or with minimal boundary adjustments to the surrounding electoral divisions, the augmented Electoral Commission unanimously agreed to make these changes. As a result, 20 electoral divisions of the augmented Electoral Commission's redistribution differ from those proposed by the Redistribution Committee. These changes have been made to better reflect communities of interest and/or improve electoral division boundaries.

While acknowledging the merits of a number of other ideas advocated in objections, comments on objections and submissions to the inquiry, they were unable to be accepted because the resultant adjustments to the boundaries led to electoral divisions which fell outside the permissible ranges. Any alternative adjustments would, in the augmented Electoral Commission's opinion, have caused significant flow-on effects for other electoral divisions across Victoria under the requirements of the Electoral Act.

Electoral movements

Overall, 483,173 electors enrolled in Victoria (or 11.36 per cent of all electors enrolled in Victoria on Wednesday 15 July 2020) will change their federal electoral division as a result of this redistribution.

Implementation of this redistribution

Changes to electoral divisions as a result of this redistribution will apply from the day on which a notice of determination is published in the Gazette. This notice was published on Monday 26 July 2021.

Electoral events will not be contested on these new federal electoral divisions until a writ is issued for a general election following the expiry or dissolution of the House of Representatives.

Chapter 1:

Background and context

This chapter outlines the legislative requirements of the redistribution from the release of the Redistribution Committee for Victoria's (the Redistribution Committee's) proposed redistribution to the determination of the names and boundaries of electoral divisions by the augmented Electoral Commission for Victoria (the augmented Electoral Commission).

1. A redistribution of electoral divisions is the process where electoral divisions and their names and boundaries are reviewed, and may be altered, to ensure, as near as practicable:
 - each state and territory gains representation in the House of Representatives in proportion to the population of the state or territory, and
 - there are a similar number of electors in each electoral division for a given state or territory.

Compliance with legislative requirements

2. The *Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918* (the Electoral Act) specifies that a redistribution process should be undertaken when:
 - the number of members of the House of Representatives to which a state or territory is entitled has changed (relative population change)
 - the number of electors in more than one-third of the electoral divisions in a state (or one of the electoral divisions in the Australian Capital Territory or the Northern Territory) deviates from the average divisional enrolment by over ten per cent for a period of more than two months, or
 - a period of seven years has elapsed since the last redistribution process was determined.¹
3. The procedures to be followed in conducting a redistribution process are also specified in the Electoral Act. Appendix A summarises the legislative requirements which have been followed in conducting this redistribution. Each of these requirements is discussed in further detail in this chapter.

Background to this redistribution

4. The steps followed from the commencement of the redistribution of Victoria to the release of the Redistribution Committee's proposed redistribution are outlined in Chapter 1 of the Redistribution Committee's report: *Proposed redistribution of Victoria into electoral divisions*.²

Requirement to conduct a redistribution of electoral divisions in Victoria and commencement

5. On Friday 3 July 2020, the Electoral Commissioner made a determination under sub-section 48(1) of the Electoral Act of the number of members of the House of Representatives each state and territory would be entitled to at the next general election.³
6. As a result of this determination, Victoria's entitlement increased from 38 to 39 members of the House of Representatives.
7. In accordance with sub-section 59(1) of the Electoral Act, the Electoral Commission published a notice in the *Commonwealth Government Notices Gazette* (the Gazette) on Wednesday 15 July 2020 directing that a redistribution of Victoria into 39 electoral divisions commence.

Redistribution quota

8. Section 65 of the Electoral Act requires the Electoral Commissioner, as soon as practicable after the redistribution process commences, to determine the redistribution quota or average divisional enrolment using the following formula:⁴

$$\frac{\text{Number of electors enrolled in Victoria as at the end of the day on which the redistribution commenced (Wednesday 15 July 2020)}}{\text{Number of members of the House of Representatives to which Victoria is entitled}}$$

9. In calculating this quota, sub-section 65(2) of the Electoral Act provides that:
 - where the result includes a fraction that is less than 0.5, the number is rounded down to the nearest whole number, or
 - where the result includes a fraction that is equal to or greater than 0.5, the number is rounded up to the nearest whole number.
10. Table A shows the figures used to calculate the redistribution quota and the resultant range of the permissible maximum and minimum number of electors in an electoral division (discussed further in the section titled 'Statutory requirements for the making of a redistribution').

11. As part of the redistribution process, the Redistribution Committee is required to ensure that the number of electors in a proposed electoral division is within the range of plus 10 per cent and minus 10 per cent of the redistribution quota (see Appendix B).

12. The number of electors at the commencement date of Wednesday 15 July 2020 at both the electoral division and Statistical Area 1s (SA1s) level were published on the AEC website when the invitation for interested individuals and organisations to submit suggestions and comments on suggestions was made.⁵

Enrolment projections and projected enrolment quota

13. When determining a redistribution, the augmented Electoral Commission is required by paragraph 73(4)(a) to ensure, as far as practicable, that the number of electors enrolled in the electoral division at the projection time will be within the range of plus 3.5 per cent and minus 3.5 per cent of the projected enrolment quota (see Appendix B). This quota is calculated using the following formula:

$$\frac{\text{Estimated total number of electors enrolled in Victoria at the projection time (Sunday 26 January 2025)}}{\text{Number of members of the House of Representatives to which Victoria is entitled}}$$

14. For the purposes of this redistribution, projected enrolment has been calculated by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS). These projections were subsequently reviewed by AEC officers.
15. Projected enrolment at the projection time of Sunday 26 January 2025, together with the processes used by the ABS to calculate these projections, were published on the AEC website when the invitation for interested individuals and organisations to submit suggestions and comments on suggestions was made. The projections were made available at both the electoral division and SA1 level.⁶
16. Table B shows the figures used to calculate the projected enrolment quota and the resultant range of the permissible maximum and minimum number of electors in an electoral division at the projection time (discussed further in the section titled ‘Statutory requirements for the making of a redistribution’).

Release of proposed redistribution of Victoria

17. Sub-section 66(1) of the Electoral Act requires the Redistribution Committee to make a proposed redistribution, with section 67 requiring that written reasons for the proposed redistribution be provided.
18. In its report *Proposed redistribution of Victoria into electoral divisions*, the Redistribution Committee outlined its proposed redistribution of Victoria and in Chapter 2 and Appendix F explained the reasons behind its proposal.⁷ On Friday 19 March 2021, this report was made available on the AEC website and in each AEC office located in Victoria.
19. In addition, and as required by sub-section 68(1) of the Electoral Act, the following information was also made available at each AEC office in Victoria from Friday 19 March 2021:
 - maps showing the names and boundaries of each proposed electoral division in Victoria, and
 - copies of the 102 suggestions made to the redistribution and 48 comments on suggestions which were received.

Invitation for interested individuals and organisations to submit objections and comments on objections

20. The Redistribution Committee is required by sub-sections 68(1) and 68(2) of the Electoral Act to draw attention to the redistribution material able to be viewed at AEC offices in Victoria and to invite written objections relating to the proposed redistribution of Victoria and written comments on objections via:
 - a notice published in the Gazette on a Friday,
 - a notice published in two newspapers circulating throughout Victoria, and
 - notices published in such regional newspapers circulating in regions affected by the proposed redistribution as determined by the Redistribution Committee.
21. The notice was published in the Gazette on Friday 19 March 2021. Newspaper notices were published in:
 - *The Age*, *The Herald Sun* and *The Weekend Australian* on Saturday 27 March 2021,
 - *Weekly Times* on Wednesday 31 March 2021,⁸
 - *Koori Mail* on Wednesday 7 April 2021,⁹ and
 - 10 regional newspapers (see Appendix C for details of where and when notices were published).
22. In accordance with section 68 of the Electoral Act, these notices included a brief outline of the proposed redistribution, where to view the proposed redistribution, how to participate in the process and where to find further information.¹⁰ As required by paragraph 68(1)(d):
 - the notices published in *The Age*, *The Herald Sun*, *Weekly Times* and *Koori Mail* included maps showing the names and boundaries of each proposed electoral division in Victoria, and
 - the notices published in the regional newspapers listed in Appendix C included maps showing the names of boundaries of proposed electoral divisions in areas covered by the newspaper's circulation.¹¹

23. Table C presents information on the options for making an objection or comment on an objection, and the extent to which these options were used.

24. Interested individuals and organisations were able to submit written objections from Friday 19 March 2021 until 6pm AEST on Friday 16 April 2021, the 4th Friday after the publication of the Gazette notice.¹² During this time, 67 objections were received by the Electoral Commission (see Appendix D).
25. As required by sub-section 69(2) of the Electoral Act, copies of these objections were made available to members of the public for perusal at the office of the Australian Electoral Officer for Victoria in Melbourne from Monday 19 April 2021, the 5th Monday after the publication of the Gazette notice. The objections were also made available on the AEC website from this date.
26. Interested individuals and organisations were able to submit written comments on objections received from Monday 19 April 2021 until 6pm AEST on Friday 30 April 2021, the 6th Friday after the publication of the Gazette notice.¹³ During this time, 53 comments on objections were received by the Electoral Commission (see Appendix E).
27. As required by sub-section 69(4) of the Electoral Act, copies of these comments on objections were made available to members of the public for perusal at the office of the Australian Electoral Officer for Victoria in Melbourne from Monday 3 May 2021, the 7th Monday after the publication of the Gazette notice. The comments on objections were also made available on the AEC website on this date.

Augmented Electoral Commission for Victoria

28. Sub-section 70(1) of the Electoral Act specifies that, for the purposes of a redistribution of Victoria, an augmented Electoral Commission for Victoria is established. The membership of the augmented Electoral Commission is specified by sub-section 70(2).
29. The membership of the augmented Electoral Commission for Victoria is outlined in Table D.

30. The augmented Electoral Commission is responsible for:
 - considering all objections to the Redistribution Committee’s proposed redistribution and all comments on objections which were received by the specified lodgement times,
 - developing a proposed redistribution of Victoria in accordance with the requirements of the Electoral Act,
 - conducting an inquiry into objections, should one be required,
 - determining the names and boundaries of electoral divisions in Victoria, and
 - making the reasons for the augmented Electoral Commission’s determination available for public perusal.
31. The augmented Electoral Commission met on:
 - Tuesday 18 May 2021, and
 - Friday 11 June 2021

Consideration of objections and comments on objections by the augmented Electoral Commission

32. The augmented Electoral Commission is required by sub-section 72(1) of the Electoral Act to consider all objections to the proposed redistribution and comments on objections which were received by the required specified lodgement times.
33. In formulating its redistribution of Victoria, the augmented Electoral Commission considered each of the 67 objections to the proposed redistribution and 53 comments on objections received.
34. The augmented Electoral Commission found the written submissions made throughout the redistribution valuable and appreciates the time and effort expended by all those who contributed.
35. Chapter 2 and Appendix F outline the key themes contained in these objections and comments on objections, and how the augmented Electoral Commission responded to them, having regard to the requirements of the Electoral Act.

Inquiry by the augmented Electoral Commission into objections

36. Sub-section 72(3) of the Electoral Act requires the augmented Electoral Commission to hold an inquiry into an objection unless it is of the opinion:
 - the matters raised in the objection were raised, or are substantially the same as matters that were raised, in:
 - suggestions relating to the redistribution lodged with the Redistribution Committee; or
 - comments lodged with the Redistribution Committee; or
 - the objection is frivolous or vexatious.
37. Analysis of the 67 objections to the proposed redistribution indicated the matters to be inquired into as:
 - boundaries of the proposed Divisions of Bruce, Holt and La Trobe,
 - boundaries of the proposed Divisions of Chisholm, Deakin and Menzies,
 - boundary of the proposed Division of Hawke,
 - boundary between the proposed Divisions of Higgins and Macnamara,
 - boundary of the proposed Division of Tucker,
 - name of the proposed Division of Gellibrand,
 - name of the proposed Division of Hawke, and
 - name of the proposed Division of Tucker.
38. The manner in which an inquiry into objections is to be conducted by the augmented Electoral Commission is specified in sub-sections 72(4) to 72(9) of the Electoral Act.
39. The augmented Electoral Commission held a virtual inquiry on Monday 7 June 2021 and Friday 11 June 2021.
40. Invitations to attend the inquiry were sent to those who made objections to the proposed redistribution or commented on objections. Notices of invitation were placed in *The Age*, *The Herald Sun* and *The Weekend Australian* on Saturday 22 May 2021.
41. Appendix G lists those who made submissions to the inquiry and a transcript is included with this report. The augmented Electoral Commission found the submissions presented by those participating at the inquiry to be a valuable contribution and is appreciative of the time and effort expended by all those who contributed.
42. The augmented Electoral Commission's response to the matters raised at the inquiry is summarised in Chapter 2 and Appendix F.

Conclusion of consideration of objections by the augmented Electoral Commission

43. Sub-section 72(2) of the Electoral Act requires the augmented Electoral Commission to conclude its consideration of the objections before the expiration of 60 days after the close of comments on objections. As comments on objections closed on Friday 30 April 2021, the augmented Electoral Commission was required to conclude its consideration by Tuesday 29 June 2021.
44. Consideration of objections by the augmented Electoral Commission was concluded on Monday 28 June 2021.

Statutory requirements for the making of a redistribution

45. Section 73 of the Electoral Act requires the augmented Electoral Commission to adhere to specific criteria in determining boundaries of electoral divisions.
46. The augmented Electoral Commission endeavoured to ensure that the number of electors in each Victoria electoral division would:
 - meet the requirement of sub-section 73(4) of the Electoral Act for the number of electors in an electoral division to not be less than 90 per cent or more than 110 per cent of the redistribution quota of 109,021 electors (Table A indicates the number of electors enrolled in each electoral division in Victoria must therefore be between 98,119 and 119,923), and
 - meet the requirement of paragraph 73(4)(a) of the Electoral Act for the number of electors projected to be in an electoral division to not be less than 96.5 per cent or more than 103.5 per cent of the projected enrolment quota at the projection time of Sunday 26 January 2025 (Table B indicates the number of electors projected to be enrolled in each electoral division in Victoria at the projection time of Sunday 26 January 2025 must be between 113,009 and 121,205).
47. The augmented Electoral Commission also gave due consideration to the requirements of paragraph 73(4)(b) of the Electoral Act:
 - i. community of interests within the electoral division, including economic, social and regional interests,
 - ii. means of communication and travel within the electoral division,
 - iv. the physical features and area of the electoral division, and
 - v. the boundaries of existing electoral divisions in Victoria, with this factor being subordinate to the consideration of i, ii and iv.
48. Further details regarding these requirements are in Appendix B.
49. Appendix H outlines the mechanics of constructing electoral divisions.

Public announcement by the augmented Electoral Commission

50. Once its inquiries into objections are completed, sub-section 72(10) of the Electoral Act requires the augmented Electoral Commission to:
 - make a proposed redistribution of the state, and
 - make a public announcement.
51. While the augmented Electoral Commission is able to choose the means by which this public announcement is issued,¹⁴ sub-section 72(12) requires the following content:
 - the substance of the augmented Electoral Commission's findings or conclusions on the initial objections to the Redistribution Committee's proposed redistribution,
 - the augmented Electoral Commission's proposed redistribution of the state/territory, and
 - a statement whether, in the opinion of the augmented Electoral Commission, its proposed redistribution is significantly different from the Redistribution Committee's proposed redistribution.¹⁵
52. The augmented Electoral Commission did not consider their proposed redistribution to be significantly different to that of the Redistribution Committee. The text of the augmented Electoral Commission's public announcement, which was made on Tuesday 29 June 2021, is at Appendix I.

Determination made by the augmented Electoral Commission for Victoria

53. In accordance with sub-section 73(1) of the Electoral Act, the names and boundaries of electoral divisions for a territory are determined when the augmented Electoral Commission publishes a notice in the Gazette.
54. The text of the notice published in the Gazette on Monday 26 July 2021 is at Appendix J.

Chapter 2:

The augmented Electoral Commission's redistribution and reasons for the redistribution

This chapter outlines the augmented Electoral Commission's redistribution and the reasons for this redistribution. Also included is the augmented Electoral Commission's approach to formulating the names and boundaries of electoral divisions.

Augmented Electoral Commission's redistribution of Victoria

55. The augmented Electoral Commission was required to redistribute Victoria into 39 electoral divisions.
56. The augmented Electoral Commission decided to adopt the proposal of the Redistribution Committee, as outlined in *Proposed redistribution of Victoria into electoral divisions*, with some modifications.
57. There are three components to the augmented Electoral Commission's redistribution:
 - where to locate the new electoral division,
 - the names of the 39 electoral divisions, and
 - where to draw the boundaries between electoral divisions in Victoria to accommodate the new electoral division.

New electoral division

58. The new electoral division is located to the north-west of Melbourne and is named 'Hawke' in recognition of the Hon. Robert James Lee Hawke AC (1929–2019), Prime Minister of Australia from 1983 to 1991, as proposed by the Redistribution Committee.

Names of electoral divisions

59. The augmented Electoral Commission has made a modification to the Redistribution Committee's proposed names.
60. The augmented Electoral Commission has:
 - retained the name of the Division of Corangamite rather than rename it 'Tucker', as had been proposed by the Redistribution Committee, and
 - adopted the Redistribution Committee's proposal to retain the names of the remaining 37 electoral divisions.

61. This is consistent with the 'Guidelines for naming federal electoral divisions' (the guidelines) and the sentiments expressed in many objections to the proposed redistribution, comments on objections and submissions to the inquiry.
62. Appendix K presents some summary information about Victoria's electoral division names and how this compares to electoral division names in place at the start of this redistribution.

Boundaries of electoral divisions

63. With respect to the boundaries of electoral divisions in Victoria, the augmented Electoral Commission was required to:
 - create a new electoral division which meets the requirements of the Electoral Act, and
 - alter the boundaries of 19 of Victoria's 38 electoral divisions which did not meet the numerical requirements of the Electoral Act.
64. The augmented Electoral Commission has adopted the boundaries proposed by the Redistribution Committee with some modifications. Table E indicates:
 - where the augmented Electoral Commission has modified electoral division boundaries proposed by the Redistribution Committee, and
 - where the augmented Electoral Commission has adopted the Redistribution Committee's electoral divisions without change.
65. As a result, 30 electoral divisions have different boundaries compared to those in place at the start of the redistribution, while eight remain unchanged.¹⁶

66. The augmented Electoral Commission's modifications are listed in Appendix I and are discussed below.

New electoral division

67. The Redistribution Committee proposed creating the new electoral division to the north-west of Melbourne, specifically incorporating electors from the local government areas of Hume City Council, Melton City Council and Moorabool Shire Council, to be named the Division of Hawke.¹⁷
68. Very few objections to the proposed redistribution, comments on objections and submissions made to the inquiry referred to the placement of the new electoral division, with those submitted:
 - supporting the new electoral division being based on Melton, Bacchus Marsh and Sunbury,¹⁸
 - advocating that Bacchus Marsh should not be located in the proposed Division of Hawke or not in the same electoral division as Sunbury and Melton,¹⁹ or
 - arguing that the eastern boundary of the Division of Hawke should extend eastwards along the rail corridor rather than northwards, excluding Sunbury.²⁰
69. The augmented Electoral Commission noted these objections, however, did not consider the advocated changes were a significant improvement on the proposed boundaries. The augmented Electoral Commission concluded the Redistribution Committee's proposal was sound and should be adopted without change.
70. The new Division of Hawke will be located to the north-west of Melbourne, specifically incorporating electors from the local government areas of Hume City Council, Melton City Council and Moorabool Shire Council.

Augmented Electoral Commission's approach to naming electoral divisions

71. The naming of federal electoral divisions has been the subject of a number of recommendations from parliamentary committees. The guidelines were developed by the AEC from recommendations made by the Joint Standing Committee on Electoral Matters in 1995 in *Electoral Redistributions: Report on the Effectiveness and Appropriateness of the Redistribution Provisions of Parts III and IV of the Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918*. The guidelines are publicly available on the AEC website (see Appendix K for a copy), with attention directed to this availability when the redistribution was advertised.

Name of the new electoral division

72. A significant number of names for the new electoral division were advocated in suggestions to the redistribution and comments on suggestions, with a number arguing that the new electoral division be named to recognise the Hon. Robert James Lee Hawke AC, former Prime Minister of Australia.²¹
73. The Redistribution Committee also observed the guidelines which suggest:
 - in the main, electoral divisions should be named after deceased Australians who have rendered outstanding service to their country, and
 - when new electoral divisions are created the names of former Prime Ministers should be considered.²²

74. As Victoria is gaining a new electoral division, the Redistribution Committee considered it was appropriate for it to be named 'Hawke' in honour of the Hon. Robert James Lee Hawke AC (1929–2019). Mr Hawke was the Member for Wills from 1980 to 1992 and was Prime Minister of Australia from 1983 to 1991.²³
75. A small number of objections to the proposed redistribution and comments on objections supported the Redistribution Committee's proposal to name an electoral division to recognise Mr Hawke, with there being differing views as to whether this should be the new electoral division or whether it would be better to rename the proposed Division of Wills.²⁴
76. One objection argued that 'Hawke' should be used as the name of a Western Australian electoral division, not a Victorian electoral division, on the basis that he was born in Western Australia.²⁵ (This claim is incorrect as he was born in Bordertown in South Australia.) Some objections to the proposed redistribution argued that the new division shouldn't be named to recognise an individual who had no connection to the area covered by the proposed electoral division. Another objection argued that because several electoral divisions located in that specific part of Victoria had been abolished in the past and the name subsequently retired, the Division of Maribyrnong should instead be renamed 'Hawke'.
77. A number of objections to the redistribution and comments on objections to the proposed redistribution argued that the electoral division should not be named to recognise Mr Hawke.²⁶ Some argued that his alleged past behaviour was not aligned to modern norms and that naming an electoral division after such a person could be seen as endorsing the alleged behaviour. Others expressed the view that electoral divisions should not be named after former members of the House of Representatives.
78. In most cases, an alternative name to 'Hawke' was not offered, but those that were are displayed in Table F.

79. In noting the views expressed by those arguing for an alternative name for the new electoral division, the augmented Electoral Commission observed:
- electoral divisions named to recognise former Prime Ministers have been located in the same state as the electoral division the former Prime Minister represented, and
 - naming the new electoral division ‘Hawke’ would be consistent with the naming guidelines for federal electoral divisions.
80. The augmented Electoral Commission concluded the Redistribution Committee’s proposal was sound, follows the guidelines and should stand unchanged.
81. The new electoral division will be named ‘Hawke’ to recognise the Hon. Robert James Lee Hawke AC.

Renaming of proposed electoral divisions in Victoria

82. The guidelines note that the names of electoral divisions should not be changed or transferred to new areas without very strong reasons. Any decision to alter the name of an electoral division is therefore one which is not taken lightly.
83. The augmented Electoral Commission received a number of objections, comments on objections and submissions to the inquiry proposing that electoral divisions be renamed.
84. Where an alternative name to the Redistribution Committee’s proposal was advocated, the augmented Electoral Commission considered whether modifications should be made to address the alternative. The following paragraphs, together with Appendix F, outline the augmented Electoral Commission’s decisions with respect to the alternatives offered.

Renaming the proposed Division of Gellibrand

85. Several suggestions to the redistribution and comments on suggestions argued that the Division of Gellibrand should be renamed. As the Redistribution Committee did not consider that strong enough reasons to alter the electoral division name had been provided in suggestions and comments on suggestions, it proposed retaining the name of the Division of Gellibrand.²⁷
86. A number of objections to the proposed redistribution and comments on objections argued that the name ‘Gellibrand’ should be retired or that the Division of Gellibrand should be renamed ‘Tucker’ to recognise Margaret Tucker.²⁸ Those in favour of renaming the Division of Gellibrand to ‘Tucker’ observed:
- the Division of Gellibrand is named after a British colonialist, not an Australian,
 - Joseph Gellibrand, for whom the electoral division is named, had links to John Batman and the Batman Treaty and his treatment of Indigenous people is up for debate, and
 - Joseph Gellibrand did not have a sound connection to Victoria.
87. The augmented Electoral Commission observed that this is the second consecutive redistribution at which arguments have been made to change the name of the Division of Gellibrand,²⁹ however many of the alternative names offered have either not met the guidelines or are better suited as the name for another proposed electoral division. The augmented Electoral Commission does not intend renaming the proposed Division of Gellibrand at this time but encourages those who may be involved in future redistributions to consider doing so. Those wishing to rename the electoral

division are advised to review the guidelines for naming federal electoral divisions and to contribute alternative names during the suggestions period, which is the first time at which public input can be provided for consideration by the Redistribution Committee.

88. The electoral division will continue to be known as the Division of Gellibrand.

Renaming the proposed Division of Tucker

89. Several suggestions to the redistribution and comments on suggestions supported renaming the Division of Corangamite. The Redistribution Committee formed the view that it would be appropriate to rename the electoral division due to its changed nature as a result of significant proposed changes to the boundaries of the electoral division.³⁰ The Redistribution Committee proposed renaming the Division of Corangamite to 'Tucker' to honour and recognise Margaret (Lilardia) Elizabeth Tucker MBE (1904–1996), a Yorta Yorta woman, for her significant work to create a more equal and understanding society for Aboriginal people.
90. A number of objections to the proposed redistribution and comments on objections were of the view that an electoral division be named to recognise Margaret Tucker,³¹ although arguments were made that:
- 'Lilardia', Margaret Tucker's Aboriginal name,³² be used instead of 'Tucker',³³ or
 - there may be a more appropriate electoral division than 'Corangamite' to be named to recognise Margaret Tucker.³⁴ The proposed Divisions of Flinders, Gellibrand, Hawke, Hotham, Mallee and Nicholls were all suggested as suitable alternative electoral divisions to bear the name 'Tucker'.³⁵
91. A significant number of objections to the proposed redistribution, comments on objections and submissions to the inquiry did not support renaming the Division of Corangamite to 'Tucker'. Those arguing against renaming the electoral division to 'Tucker' advanced the following arguments:
- Margaret Tucker does not have a sufficient connection to the electoral division and is not known by the community,
 - 'Tucker' can easily be changed by graffiti to a word which will open the electoral division and the local member to ridicule,
 - if the electoral division is to be renamed, it should be to a name relevant to the Indigenous people associated with the country covered by the proposed electoral division, and/or
 - the name 'Corangamite' should be retained as it is a Federation name, an Aboriginal name, and a name that is still strongly connected to the area.
92. The desire of those resident in the proposed electoral division to retain an Aboriginal name for their electoral division that had a connection to the country covered by the proposed electoral division was strongly argued throughout objections to the proposed redistribution, comments on objections and submissions to the inquiry. Many indicated that their preference would be to retain 'Corangamite'. Some objections noted that the name 'Corangamite' has a strong connection to the area covered by the electoral division itself, rather than simply the lake or the local government area. Several arguments

were made that it was not appropriate to name the electoral division in recognition of Margaret Tucker as she was a Yorta Yorta woman with Yorta Yorta country spanning from Cohuna to Albury/Wodonga and covering land on both sides of the Murray River.³⁶

93. Several alternative names were offered should the augmented Electoral Commission decide against using the name ‘Tucker’ or retaining the name ‘Corangamite’, with these names connected to the country included in the proposed electoral division. These alternatives are displayed in Table G.

94. In making its decision, the augmented Electoral Commission was mindful of the following elements of the guidelines, and observed arguments could be made for and against each of them:
- every effort should be made to retain the names of original Federation electoral divisions,
 - locality or place names should generally be avoided,
 - Aboriginal names should be used where appropriate and as far as possible existing Aboriginal divisional names should be retained, and
 - names of electoral divisions should not be changed or transferred to new areas without very strong reasons.
95. The augmented Electoral Commission considered the arguments opposing the use of the name ‘Tucker’ for the electoral division presented by those making objections to the proposed redistribution, commenting on objections or making submissions to the inquiry. It was not convinced by arguments that an electoral division should not be named after Margaret Tucker because she was not significant, was an activist female and was not known by an Indigenous name. Women, specifically Indigenous women, are under-represented in the names of federal electoral divisions, and frequently unrecognised for their achievements. The augmented Electoral Commission does not accept that, as Margaret Tucker is currently unrecognised by some segments of society, she should not be recognised today, and notes its own role in addressing such imbalances and oversights. The augmented Electoral Commission commends Margaret Tucker as an individual who has rendered outstanding service to Australia through her campaigning for citizenship rights for, and the health and welfare of, Aboriginal people.

96. On balance, however, the augmented Electoral Commission considered that, at this time, it would be appropriate to retain the name 'Corangamite'. Doing so will allow for the retention of a Federation name and an Aboriginal name.
97. As a consequence, the augmented Electoral Commission does not propose naming an electoral division to recognise Margaret Tucker at this time but encourages those who may be involved in future redistributions to consider doing so.
98. The electoral division will be known as the Division of Corangamite.

Renaming of the remaining electoral divisions

99. The Redistribution Committee noted that many suggestions to the redistribution and comments on suggestions advocated changing the names of existing electoral divisions, but did not consider that strong enough reasons to alter electoral division names had been provided. The Redistribution Committee therefore proposed retaining the names of 37 of Victoria's remaining electoral divisions.³⁷
100. Objections to the proposed redistribution, comments on objections and submissions to the inquiry advocated renaming 10 proposed electoral divisions.³⁸ The alternative names offered are displayed in Table H.

101. The guidelines note that the names of electoral divisions should not be changed or transferred to new areas without very strong reasons. Any decision to alter the name of an electoral division is not taken lightly.
102. While noting the contribution to Australian society of those individuals submitted for its consideration and the general relevance of those names submitted, the augmented Electoral Commission concluded strong enough reasons to alter the names of the electoral divisions listed in Table H were not provided. The augmented Electoral Commission concluded the Redistribution Committee’s proposal with respect to these names should stand unchanged.
103. The augmented Electoral Commission has retained the names of the electoral divisions indicated in Table I.

Augmented Electoral Commission's approach to formulating electoral boundaries

104. In deciding whether to amend the Redistribution Committee's proposal to incorporate a concept submitted in an objection, comment on objection or submission to the inquiry, the augmented Electoral Commission was mindful whether the suggested amendment would improve the Redistribution Committee's proposal. As the augmented Electoral Commission's formulation of electoral divisions must conform to the requirements of the Electoral Act, potential amendments were also analysed with respect to the requirements of sub-section 73(4) of the Electoral Act.
105. The primary requirement was to ensure each electoral division remains within the permissible maximum and minimum number of electors around the redistribution enrolment quota (see Table A) and the projected enrolment quota (see Table B). In modifying the boundaries of electoral divisions proposed by the Redistribution Committee, the augmented Electoral Commission was therefore required to ensure that each electoral division in Victoria continued to fall within the permissible ranges for the maximum and minimum number of electors in an electoral division.
106. Similarly, when considering adjusting the boundary of an electoral division to better reflect one community of interest, the augmented Electoral Commission observed that such an adjustment could prompt concerns about one or more different communities of interest.

Adjusting the boundaries of existing electoral divisions

107. In constructing their proposed redistribution, the Redistribution Committee noted that it was required to create a new electoral division and that 19 of the 38 electoral divisions did not satisfy the numerical requirements of the Electoral Act and therefore must change. To meet these requirements the Redistribution Committee proposed adjusting the boundaries of 29 of Victoria's 38 existing electoral divisions such that:³⁹
 - most electoral divisions have a rural, provincial, or metropolitan focus, with future growth more evenly distributed,
 - in a number of cases local government areas are united within one, or shared between fewer electoral divisions, and
 - proposed electoral division boundaries remain clearly defined, where possible.⁴⁰
108. The Redistribution Committee considered that this proposed redistribution would result in electoral divisions which:
 - are more equitably balanced numerically across the state,
 - can accommodate the differing projected rates of growth and decline across Victoria,
 - keep together or improve existing communities of interest, and
 - use strong and readily identifiable features such as major roads, rivers, or established administrative boundaries to define electoral division boundaries.⁴¹

109. Twenty electoral divisions in the augmented Electoral Commission's redistribution differ from those proposed by the Redistribution Committee, although a number of these changes were taken to provide more appropriate boundaries and resulted in no or minimal elector movement. Alternatives to these changes did not feature in objections to the proposed redistribution, comments on objections or submissions to the inquiry. These changes include:
- a minor realignment of the boundary between the Divisions of Casey and La Trobe to follow the Clematis locality boundary, uniting the locality of Clematis in the Division of Casey,
 - a minor realignment of the boundary between the Divisions of Indi and Nicholls to adhere to the local government area boundary between Mitchell and Murrindindi Shire Councils in the locality of Trawool,
 - a minor adjustment of the boundary between the Divisions of Jagajaga and McEwen in the locality of Diamond Creek,
 - a minor adjustment of the boundary between the Divisions of La Trobe and Monash in the locality of Lang Lang, and
 - a minor adjustment to the boundary between the Divisions of Mallee and Wannon in the locality of Black Range.
110. The augmented Electoral Commission considered the Redistribution Committee's proposal and agreed with much of what was proposed. Where an alternative to the Redistribution Committee's proposal was advocated, the augmented Electoral Commission considered whether modifications should be made to address the alternative. The following paragraphs, together with Appendix F, outline the augmented Electoral Commission's decision with respect to the alternatives offered.

The boundaries of the proposed Divisions of Bruce, Holt, and La Trobe

111. The proposed Division of Bruce's southern and eastern boundaries adjoin the proposed Divisions of Holt and La Trobe. On the boundaries in place at the start of the redistribution, the Division of Bruce needed to gain electors and the Divisions of Holt and La Trobe needed to shed electors for each of these three electoral divisions to meet the numerical requirements of the Electoral Act.⁴² To enable this to occur, and to ensure that all surrounding electoral divisions would continue to meet the numerical requirements of the Electoral Act, the Redistribution Committee proposed, amongst other movements, that:
- the proposed Division of Bruce gain electors in the areas of:⁴³
 - Berwick, Harkaway and Narre Warren from the Division of La Trobe, and
 - Hampton Park and Narre Warren South from the Division of Holt
 - the proposed Division of La Trobe gain electors in the areas of:⁴⁴
 - Clyde and Tooradin from the Division of Holt
112. As a result of the Redistribution Committee's proposal, the locality of Berwick, which has experienced high levels of population and enrolment growth, was proposed to be split across the proposed Divisions of Bruce, Holt and La Trobe.
113. There was some support for of the Redistribution Committee's proposal.⁴⁵

The electoral division(s) in which the locality of Berwick is located

114. A number of objections to the proposed redistribution, comments on objections and submissions to the inquiry took issue with the Redistribution Committee's proposed boundaries at the intersection of the Divisions of Bruce, Holt and La Trobe, particularly the splitting of Berwick along High Street/Princes Highway.⁴⁶ Arguments were made that the proposed boundary following High Street/Princes Highway in this area should instead:
- be moved further south and the centre of Berwick be located in the Division of Bruce,⁴⁷ or
 - run north-south rather than east-west and the centre of Berwick be located in the Division of La Trobe.⁴⁸
115. Arguments were also made that the part of the locality of Berwick proposed to be located in the Division of Holt be located in the Division of Bruce, which would result in the locality being split across two electoral divisions rather than three.⁴⁹
116. Noting the strong communities of interest arguments put forward in these objections to the proposed redistribution, comments on objections and submissions to the inquiry, the augmented Electoral Commission concluded the Redistribution Committee's proposal could be improved by adjusting the boundary between the Divisions of Bruce and La Trobe such that:
- the portion of Berwick to the south of Greaves Road and west of Clyde Road is located in the Division of Bruce, and
 - the portion of Berwick to the east of Harkaway Road and north of High Street/Princes Highway be located in the Division of La Trobe.
117. As a result of these adjustments, the locality of Berwick is split between fewer electoral divisions.
118. To ensure that all adjoining electoral divisions meet the Electoral Act's numerical parameters, the augmented Electoral Commission has made a number of other adjustments which are discussed in this chapter.

The electoral division(s) in which the localities of Clyde, Hampton Park, Harkaway, Narre Warren South and Tooradin are located

119. A number of those who argued for alternative boundaries through the locality of Berwick presented a number of compensatory moves involving Clyde, Hampton Park, Harkaway, Narre Warren South and/or Tooradin. Some argued that a general clockwise rotation of these areas through the Divisions of Bruce, Holt and La Trobe would result in better outcomes for communities of interest and a more even spread of growth areas across electoral divisions.⁵⁰
120. In order to ensure the proposed Divisions of Bruce, Holt and La Trobe would meet the numerical requirements of the Electoral Act, the Redistribution Committee had proposed transferring:
- Harkaway, and Narre Warren from the Division of La Trobe to the proposed Division of Bruce,⁵¹ and
 - part of Hampton Park and Narre Warren South from the Division of Holt to the proposed Division of Bruce.⁵²

121. The Redistribution Committee had proposed changes to the Division of Bruce as a consequence of the flow on effect to adjust boundaries to meet the numerical requirements of the Electoral Act. As the Divisions of Holt and La Trobe needed to lose electors for it to meet the numerical requirements of the Electoral Act, it was considered part of the northern localities within the Divisions of Isaacs and Holt and part of the western localities of La Trobe were the most appropriate locations from which the proposed Division of Bruce could gain electors.
122. The augmented Electoral Commission noted that changes presented in objections to the proposed redistribution, comments on objections and submissions to the inquiry would meet all of the requirements of the Electoral Act. As these changes would better reflect communities of interest, the augmented Electoral Commission therefore concluded the Redistribution Committee's proposal could be improved by placing:
- in the Division of Bruce: the portion of Narre Warren South located east of Narre Warren-Cranbourne Road and north of Glasscocks Road;
 - in the Division of Holt: the entire locality of Clyde, part of the locality of Tooradin and that portion of Hampton Park north of Pound Road; and
 - in the Division of La Trobe: that portion of the locality of Harkaway located east of Harkaway Road.

The boundaries of the proposed Divisions of Chisholm, Deakin and Menzies

123. At its northern end, the proposed Division of Chisholm's boundary adjoins the proposed Divisions of Deakin and Menzies. On the boundaries in place at the start of the redistribution, each of these three electoral divisions were required to gain electors to meet the numerical requirements of the Electoral Act.⁵³ To enable this to occur and to ensure that all surrounding electoral divisions would continue to meet the numerical requirements of the Electoral Act, the Redistribution Committee proposed that these electoral divisions move generally southwards. Specifically, the Redistribution Committee proposed that:
- the proposed Division of Chisholm gain electors in:
 - the balance of Chadstone, Glen Waverley and Mount Waverley, plus Wheelers Hill, Notting Hill and parts of Clayton, Oakleigh, Oakleigh East and Mulgrave from the Division of Hotham⁵⁴
 - the proposed Division of Menzies gain electors in:
 - Box Hill North, Blackburn North and parts of Box Hill, Blackburn and Nunawading from the Division of Chisholm⁵⁵
 - the proposed Division of Deakin gain electors in:
 - the balance of Forest Hill, a further part of Nunawading, and parts of Blackburn and Burwood East from the Division of Chisholm, and
 - the locality of Warranwood, from the Division of Menzies, uniting Maroondah City Council in the proposed Division of Deakin⁵⁶
124. Several objections to the proposed redistribution and comments on objections supported the Redistribution Committee's proposal.⁵⁷

The electoral division(s) in which the localities of Blackburn, Box Hill, Nunawading and surrounds are located

125. The Redistribution Committee's proposal allocated the localities of Box Hill, Blackburn, Nunawading and surrounds between the proposed Divisions of Chisholm, Deakin and Menzies.
126. A number of objections, comments on objections and submissions to the inquiry disagreed with the Redistribution Committee's proposal to use Whitehorse Road as the northern boundary of the Division of Chisholm and proposed alternatives such as Canterbury Road, Koonung Creek or Gardiners Creek be used.⁵⁸ It was argued that communities of interest would be improved by avoiding the split of shopping precincts and uniting all or some of Box Hill, Box Hill North, Blackburn and Blackburn North in one electoral division. Some also advocated for the boundary between the proposed divisions of Chisholm and Deakin to be moved east to Springvale Road, resulting in Burwood East and part of Forest Hill being located in the proposed Division of Chisholm.⁵⁹ Others requested the boundary be adjusted so that Burwood East specifically be located in the proposed Division of Chisholm rather than split between the proposed Divisions of Chisholm and Deakin.⁶⁰
127. In addition to arguments for a different northern boundary for the Division of Chisholm, a number of objections, comments on objections and submissions to the inquiry provided competing arguments as to the most appropriate placement of the localities of Box Hill, Blackburn, Nunawading and surrounds. Some supported the Redistribution Committee's proposal that these northern areas of Whitehorse City Council be located in the Division of Menzies.⁶¹ Others argued that the southern boundary of the Division of Menzies should not cross Koonung Creek in this area and instead the Division of Deakin should extend further west to incorporate Box Hill, Blackburn, Nunawading and surrounds.⁶²
128. The augmented Electoral Commission noted the range of arguments regarding communities of interest in this area, however, was not able to accommodate all proposals without significant impacts on electoral divisions elsewhere. The augmented Electoral Commission did agree that the Redistribution Committee's proposal could be improved and concluded that:
 - uniting the locality of Burwood East in the Division of Chisholm by relocating that portion bounded by Burwood Highway, Blackburn Road, Hawthorn Road and Mahoneys Road, would better reflect communities of interest and could be adopted, and
 - any other alternatives proposed or other adjustments necessary to accommodate these changes within the requirements of the Electoral Act would not result in an improved outcome for all impacted divisions at this time.

The electoral division(s) in which the locality of Oakleigh East is located

129. The Division of Hotham, as it existed at the commencement of this redistribution:
- needed to gain electors to meet the numerical requirements of the Electoral Act,⁶³ and
 - shared boundaries with six other electoral divisions, two of which needed to gain electors in order to meet the requirements of the Electoral Act.⁶⁴
130. To enable this to occur and to ensure that all surrounding electoral divisions would continue to meet the numerical requirements of the Electoral Act, the Redistribution Committee proposed that these electoral divisions move generally southwards. Specifically, the Redistribution Committee proposed that the proposed Division of Chisholm gain the balance of electors in Chadstone, Glen Waverley and Mount Waverley, plus Wheelers Hill, Notting Hill and parts of Clayton, Oakleigh, Oakleigh East and Mulgrave from the Division of Hotham.⁶⁵
131. Some objections to the proposed redistribution, comments on objections and submissions to the inquiry were against the Redistribution Committee's proposal to use Dandenong and Wellington Roads as the southern boundary of the Division of Chisholm and proposed alternatives such as, or combinations of, the Monash Freeway, Ferntree Gully Road and/or Police Road.⁶⁶ Such an alteration would enable the locality of Oakleigh East to be united in the one proposed electoral division.
132. The augmented Electoral Commission observed that uniting the locality of Oakleigh East in the Division of Hotham would better reflect communities of interest and could be accommodated within the numerical requirements of the Electoral Act.
133. The locality of Oakleigh East, in its entirety, will be located in the Division of Hotham.

The electoral division(s) in which the locality of Surrey Hills is located

134. Prior to the commencement of this redistribution, the locality of Surrey Hills was split across the Divisions of Chisholm and Kooyong. While a number of suggestions to the redistribution and comments on suggestions proposed that the Division of Kooyong gain the balance of the locality of Surrey Hills from the Division of Chisholm, the Redistribution Committee decided against making this change.⁶⁷
135. A small number of comments on objections and submissions to the inquiry argued that community of interest could be improved by:
- uniting Surrey Hills in the one electoral division, noting this would be dependent on the final arrangement of boundaries of the Divisions of Chisholm, Deakin, Kooyong and Menzies,⁶⁸ or
 - transferring the remainder of the locality of Surrey Hills bounded by Riversdale Road, Elgar Road, Canterbury Road and Warrigal Road from the Division of Chisholm into the proposed Division of Kooyong.⁶⁹
136. The augmented Electoral Commission observed that, given the other changes being made to the Division of Chisholm, this move could be accommodated within the numerical requirements of the Electoral Act. The augmented Electoral Commission therefore concluded the Redistribution

Committee's proposal could be improved and has moved the portion of the locality of Surrey Hills bounded by Riversdale Road, Elgar Road, Canterbury Road and Warrigal Road into the Division of Kooyong. As a result, the locality Surrey Hills is united in the Division of Kooyong.

The orientation of the Divisions of Chisholm and Menzies

137. The Redistribution Committee proposed a number of changes to the Divisions of Deakin and Menzies in order to meet the numerical and community of interest requirements of the Electoral Act.⁷⁰ These changes generally resulted in the east-west orientation of the Divisions of Deakin and Menzies being maintained.
138. Several objections to the proposed redistribution and comments on objections argued the proposed Divisions of Deakin and Menzies be realigned as north-south oriented electoral divisions, generally seeing:⁷¹
 - Maroondah City Council and eastern parts of Manningham City Council located in the Division of Deakin, including Croydon, Ringwood, Warrandyte, Warranwood, and surrounding areas; and
 - parts of Whitehorse City Council north of Canterbury Road and western parts of Manningham City Council located in the Division of Menzies, including Blackburn, Box Hill, Doncaster, Templestowe, and surrounding areas.
139. The augmented Electoral Commission acknowledged the opposing submissions, however, did not consider significant realignment of these electoral divisions was necessary to meet the requirements of the Electoral Act at this time.
140. The augmented Electoral Commission concluded the Redistribution Committee's proposal was sound and should be adopted without change. The boundary between the Divisions of Deakin and Menzies will be as proposed by the Redistribution Committee.

The boundary of the proposed Division of Corangamite (previously the proposed Division of Tucker)

141. On the boundaries in place at the start of redistribution, the Division of Corangamite needed to lose electors.
142. The Redistribution Committee considered the community ties between the Golden Plains Shire Council and the Division of Ballarat and therefore proposed altering the existing boundary of the Division of Corangamite so as to transfer part of Golden Plains Shire Council, including Lethbridge and Meredith, to the proposed Division of Ballarat.
143. The Redistribution Committee deemed no change was required to the boundary between the proposed Divisions of Tucker and Corio, and therefore considered the west of the Division of Corangamite to be the most sensible place to transfer further electors. The Redistribution Committee proposed moving the balance of Colac Otway Shire Council plus the eastern parts of the Surf Coast Shire Council, including Anglesea, Lorne and Winchelsea, to the proposed Division of Wannon, uniting communities along the Great Ocean Road and the Otway hinterland in the more regionally oriented proposed electoral division.⁷²

The electoral division(s) in which Surf Coast Shire Council is located

144. Some objections to the proposed redistribution argued that the electoral division should be based on Lake Corangamite,⁷³ with one objection arguing that a proposed Division of Corangamite should be based on Lake Corangamite and a new Division of Tucker should be based on the Bellarine Peninsula and the urban growth corridor from Geelong to Ballarat.⁷⁴ Comments on objections to the proposed redistribution sought to modify the proposed electoral division boundaries by retaining some or all of Aireys Inlet, Anglesea, Fairhaven and Lorne, which are located in the Surf Coast Shire Council, in the electoral division rather than being transferred to the proposed Division of Wannon.⁷⁵
145. These objections and comments on objections argued:
- these areas were strongly aligned with towns to the east, such as Geelong and Torquay, rather than those to the west, such as Warrnambool and Hamilton,
 - the Redistribution Committee's proposed electoral division boundaries would lead to a reduction in the representation of electors' interests and their disenfranchisement, and
 - there is no common community of interest with the Division of Wannon, which has an agricultural focus, whereas these areas are focused on culture and industries.
146. In considering arguments that that the boundaries of the proposed Division of Corangamite should extend further to the west and should include more of the Surf Coast Shire Council, the augmented Electoral Commission noted that concerns about the quality of representation, or any potential change in representation, fall outside of the scope of the augmented Electoral Commission's considerations.⁷⁶ Further, for the numerical requirements of the Electoral Act to be met, it was not possible to adjust the boundaries of the electoral division in order to accommodate the ideas about the Surf Coast Shire Council advanced in objections and comments on objections.
147. The augmented Electoral Commission concluded that:
- the Redistribution Committee's proposal was sound, and
 - any alternatives proposed, or other adjustments necessary to accommodate these changes within the requirements of the Electoral Act, would not result in an improved outcome at this time.

The electoral division(s) in which Inverleigh, Lethbridge, Shelford and Teesdale are located

148. Other objections to the proposed redistribution sought to alter the proposed electoral division by retaining some or all of Inverleigh, Lethbridge, Shelford and Teesdale, which are located in Golden Plains Shire Council, in the electoral division rather than being transferred to the proposed Division of Ballarat.⁷⁷ Those arguing for these changes did so on the basis of:
- community of interest, with it being argued that these communities were more aligned with Geelong than Ballarat, and
 - the belief that the distance of these towns from the City of Ballarat would result in poor representation from the elected Member.
149. An alternative idea offered was to transfer Inverleigh to the Division of Wannon on the basis that the Redistribution Committee's proposed boundaries left it isolated from other communities along the Hamilton Highway.⁷⁸
150. The augmented Electoral Commission observed that Teesdale in particular is an area that is growing and is likely to continue to grow. Noting that substantial changes to the boundaries of the electoral division were proposed by the Redistribution Committee in order to accommodate the high growth in the Division of Corangamite, the augmented Electoral Commission observed that it would not be possible to incorporate all of the localities advanced in objections.
151. Observing that the locality of Inverleigh was split over two electoral divisions, the augmented Electoral Commission noted that adjusted boundaries would enable Inverleigh in its entirety to be located in the Division of Corangamite. As this change would better reflect communities of interest, the augmented Electoral Commission concluded the Redistribution Committee's proposal could be improved.
152. The locality of Inverleigh, together with Hesse and that portion of Wingeel in the Golden Plains Shire, will be located in the Division of Corangamite.

The boundary of the proposed Division of Hawke

153. The Redistribution Committee proposed creating the new electoral division to the north-west of Melbourne, specifically incorporating electors from the local government areas of Hume City Council, Melton City Council and Moorabool Shire Council, to be named the Division of Hawke. The proposed new electoral division incorporated high-growth areas around Bacchus Marsh, Melton and Sunbury.⁷⁹
154. While there was some support for the Redistribution Committee's proposal,⁸⁰ several objections to the proposed redistribution argued:
- Bacchus Marsh should not be located in the same electoral division as Sunbury and Melton but should remain in a regional electoral division,⁸¹
 - Bacchus Marsh should be located in a different electoral division,⁸²
 - the eastern boundary of the Division of Hawke should extend eastwards along the rail corridor rather than northwards, excluding Sunbury,⁸³ and
 - more or all of the Moorabool Shire should be retained in the Division of Ballarat.⁸⁴

155. Those arguing against the inclusion of these areas in the proposed Division of Hawke were of the view that these predominantly rural and farming areas did not fit within the proposed electoral division.
156. The augmented Electoral Commission observed that Bacchus Marsh is an area that is growing and is likely to continue to grow.
157. The augmented Electoral Commission concluded that:
 - the Redistribution Committee's proposal was sound,
 - the inclusion of Bacchus Marsh in a different electoral division would require large compensating changes to a number of electoral divisions which would lead to communities having similarly strong claims regarding the electoral division they should be placed in,
 - any alternatives proposed or other adjustments necessary to accommodate these changes within the requirements of the Electoral Act would not result in an improved outcome at this time and would have significant consequential effects on the rest of the redistribution, and
 - for these reasons, the Redistribution Committee's proposal should stand unchanged.
158. The localities of Bacchus Marsh, Sunbury and Melton will be located in the Division of Hawke.

The boundary between the proposed Divisions of Higgins and Macnamara

159. On the boundaries in place at the commencement of the redistribution, the Division of Macnamara needed to lose electors in order to meet both of the numerical parameters required by the Electoral Act. The Redistribution Committee proposed that:
 - the proposed Division of Macnamara gain territory in the Stonnington City Council from the Division of Higgins, gaining all territory west of Williams Road (South Yarra and part of Prahran), and
 - the Division of Macnamara transfer all territory east of Williams Road to the proposed Division of Higgins, being part of Port Phillip City Council and its share of Glen Eira City Council (Caulfield East, Caulfield, Caulfield North and parts of St Kilda East and Elsternwick).⁸⁵
160. Several objections to the proposed redistribution and comments on objections supported the Redistribution Committee's proposal.⁸⁶ Supporting arguments noted that:
 - the proposed electoral division boundaries unite parts of both the Jewish and non-Jewish communities, including the LGBTIQ+ community,
 - the Jewish community is not located solely in St Kilda, and
 - Melbourne's Jewish community is diverse, and many Jewish people live outside of areas of higher Jewish population density.
161. Objections to the proposed redistribution, comments on objections and submissions to the inquiry opposing the Redistribution Committee's alteration of the boundary argued that the proposed boundary split a community of interest based on Melbourne's Jewish community, with the adoption of Hotham Street and Williams Road as a boundary splitting inner city suburbs that shared common commercial centres, transport links, school zones and community groups.⁸⁷ Arguments were made that the Redistribution Committee had proposed more substantial moves than were required to meet the numerical parameters of the Electoral Act, which could instead be met if the only change to be made was transferring the locality of Windsor to the proposed Division of Higgins.⁸⁸

162. The augmented Electoral Commission observed that:
- the primary factor for consideration in determining electoral divisions is to ensure the two numerical requirements of the Electoral Act are met,
 - the Division of Macnamara, as it existed at the commencement of the redistribution, exceeded the permissible requirement for projected enrolment under the Electoral Act and was therefore required to transfer electors to one or more other electoral divisions,
 - the Division of Macnamara is projected to continue to grow and will likely need to transfer further areas to other electoral divisions in the future,
 - communities of interest evolve over time, individuals' perceptions of communities of interest may reasonably differ, and individuals may relate to more than one community of interest, and
 - minimisation of elector movement is generally desirable and movement can be minimised where existing boundaries are retained, although this factor is subordinate to other considerations.
163. The augmented Electoral Commission has altered the Redistribution Committee's proposal by:
- locating that portion of the localities of South Yarra and Windsor located to the east of Punt Road and that portion of the locality of Prahran located between Punt Road and Williams Road in the Division of Higgins, and
 - locating the entirety of the localities of Caulfield, Caulfield East and Caulfield North, together with that portion of the locality of St Kilda East located to the east of Hotham Street and those portions of the localities of Elsternwick and Glen Huntly located to the north of Glen Huntly Road in the Division of Macnamara.
164. As a result, the Division of Macnamara is the same as at the commencement of the redistribution, except that the majority of the locality of Windsor has been transferred to the Division of Higgins.

The electoral division(s) in which the localities of Dandenong and Lyndhurst are located

165. The Redistribution Committee proposed transferring:
- the balance of the locality of Dandenong, plus that part of Dandenong South north of the Dandenong Bypass, from the Division of Isaacs to the proposed Division of Bruce, uniting this community of interest in the proposed Division of Bruce, and
 - the balance of the locality of Lyndhurst from the Division of Holt to the proposed Division of Isaacs to provide an equitable distribution of electors between the two electoral divisions.⁸⁹
166. These transfers were a result of changes required to be made to the adjoining Division of Holt, which needed to undergo a significant reduction in the number of electors to meet the numerical parameters of the Electoral Act.⁹⁰
167. A number of objections to the proposed redistribution, comments on objections and submissions to the inquiry advocated that the part of Dandenong south of the rail line be retained in the Division of Isaacs and the residential part of Lyndhurst be retained in the Division of Holt.⁹¹ These arguments were made on the basis that the southern part of Dandenong shares strong community of interest links with Keysborough and that the residential part of Lyndhurst shares stronger links with other areas of the Division of Holt.

168. The augmented Electoral Commission noted that these adjustments could be accommodated within the numerical requirements of the Electoral Act if alterations were made to adjoining electoral divisions, as discussed in this chapter. As these changes would better reflect communities of interest, the augmented Electoral Commission concluded the Redistribution Committee's proposal could be improved by retaining:
- the part of the locality of Dandenong, located to the south of the Pakenham-Cranbourne rail line and bounded by Eastlink, the Dandenong Bypass and the South Gippsland Highway in the Division of Isaacs, and
 - the residential part of the locality of Lyndhurst, bounded by Western Port Highway, Thompsons Road and the Cranbourne rail line in the Division of Holt.
169. As a result of these changes, the boundaries of the Division of Isaacs will be the same as those in place at the start of the redistribution.

Movement of electors between electoral divisions

170. The Redistribution Committee noted that it was required to increase or decrease the number of electors in at least 19 of Victoria's 38 electoral divisions in order to meet the numerical requirements of the Electoral Act. As not all of these electoral divisions were adjacent to each other, the Redistribution Committee observed it also needed to alter the boundaries of electoral divisions which meet those numerical requirements of the Electoral Act in order to ensure that all of Victoria's electoral divisions meet the numerical requirements.⁹² As a consequence of making changes to 29 of the existing electoral divisions in Victoria and creating one new electoral division, the Redistribution Committee proposed transferring 536,730 electors, or 12.62 per cent of electors enrolled in Victoria at the commencement of the redistribution, to another electoral division.⁹³
171. The augmented Electoral Commission was also obligated to increase or decrease the number of electors in at least 19 of Victoria's 38 electoral divisions and to create one electoral division. As the augmented Electoral Commission adopted the Redistribution Committee's proposal with some modifications, the extent of elector movements between electoral divisions decreased from those proposed by the Redistribution Committee.
172. The adjustments to electoral divisions made by the augmented Electoral Commission resulted in 53,557 fewer electors moving between electoral divisions than was proposed by the Redistribution Committee. Table J outlines the extent of elector movements resulting from the augmented Electoral Commission's redistribution. Noting the variable levels of population and enrolment growth across Victoria, together with the ongoing uncertainty as to how this may vary over coming years, the augmented Electoral Commission notes that the next redistribution of electoral divisions may require more comprehensive movements of electors across the state.

173. The Redistribution Committee's proposal to rename the Division of Corangamite would have resulted in 101,000, or approximately 2.38 per cent of electors enrolled in Victoria at the commencement of the redistribution, proposed to live in an electoral division with a new name.⁹⁴
174. As the augmented Electoral Commission has modified the Redistribution Committee's proposal by retaining the name 'Corangamite', the only electors who will experience a newly named electoral division are those who have been transferred to the Division of Hawke.

Redistribution of Victoria – by electoral division

175. For each of the electoral divisions in Victoria, Table K presents:
- initial enrolment based on enrolment figures as at Wednesday 15 July 2020,
 - percentage variation from the redistribution quota,
 - projected enrolment as at Sunday 26 January 2025,
 - percentage variation from the projected enrolment quota, and
 - the approximate area of each proposed electoral division.

176. Numerical summaries of the electoral divisions are provided in Appendix M. These summaries are provided to assist electors to identify if their electoral division has been altered as a result of this redistribution.

Chapter 3:

Implementation of the redistribution

This chapter outlines what the implementation of the redistribution means in practice for residents of Victoria.

177. In accordance with sub-section 73(1) of the Electoral Act, the electoral divisions described in this report came into effect from Monday 26 July 2021 as this is the day on which the augmented Electoral Commission published a notice in the Gazette determining the names and boundaries of electoral divisions in Victoria.
178. However, members of the House of Representatives will not represent or contest these electoral divisions until after a writ is issued for a general election following the expiration or dissolution of the House of Representatives.
179. In practice, this means:
 - electors will continue to be represented by the members of the House of Representatives who were elected at the most recent federal general election on Saturday 18 May 2019 or at a by-election held after that date,
 - members of the House of Representatives represent the electoral divisions which were in place at the most recent federal general election on Saturday 18 May 2019,
 - where relevant, allowances for members of the House of Representatives are calculated based on the electoral divisions in place at the most recent federal general election,
 - from Monday 26 July 2021, enrolment statistics will be published based on the electoral divisions described in this report,⁹⁵ and
 - from Monday 26 July 2021, members of the House of Representatives are able to request copies of the electoral roll for any electoral division which includes all or part of the electoral division for which they were elected.⁹⁶

When do the new electoral divisions apply?

180. While the new names and boundaries of electoral divisions apply from Monday 26 July 2021, elections will not be contested on these new electoral divisions until a writ is issued for a general election following the expiration or dissolution of the House of Representatives.

Do I need to do anything to change my electoral division?

181. Individuals do not need to take any action where their electoral division changes as the result of a redistribution. Section 86 of the Electoral Act requires the AEC to:
- transfer the elector to the new electoral roll, and
 - notify the elector their electoral division has changed.⁹⁷

For how long will the new electoral divisions apply?

182. Sub-section 73(1) of the Electoral Act provides that the new electoral divisions apply until the determination of the next redistribution via publication of a notice in the Gazette. This determination may be made as a result of sub-section 73(1) or sub-section 76(6) of the Electoral Act.

On which electoral divisions would a by-election be contested?

183. By-elections are conducted using the electoral divisions which existed prior to the determination of the redistribution, as provided by sub-sections 73(6) and 73(7) of the Electoral Act.

How do I find out if my electoral division has changed?

184. You can check your enrolment by using the AEC's online enrolment verification facility available at: www.aec.gov.au/check For privacy reasons, your electoral enrolment will only be confirmed if the details you enter are an exact match to your details on the electoral roll.
185. Alternatively, you can contact the AEC on 13 23 26 or use the 'Find my electorate' tool on the AEC website at: www.aec.gov.au/electorate, which will enable you to find:
- which federal electorate you live in,
 - a profile and map of your electoral division, and
 - the name of the incumbent member of the House of Representatives for your electoral division.

Do I need to know my electoral division to enrol or update my enrolment details?

186. No, all you need to do is provide the details of your residential address and the AEC will tell you which electoral division you are enrolled for. You can enrol by using:
- the AEC's online enrolment service available at: www.aec.gov.au/enrol/,
 - completing and printing a PDF enrolment form available from the AEC website and returning it to the AEC, or
 - picking up an enrolment form at any AEC office and returning it to the AEC.

⁹⁷ Sub-section 86(3) of the Electoral Act provides for this notification to be via a notice published in a newspaper or a notice delivered to the elector's address.

Where can I find information about the new electoral divisions?

187. Maps and descriptions of the new electoral divisions are available on the AEC website.

Where can I find information about the electoral divisions which applied at previous federal elections?

188. Maps and descriptions of previous electoral divisions are available on the AEC website.

Is geospatial data for the new electoral divisions available?

189. Individual state/territory boundaries are available on the relevant redistribution page and on the Maps and Spatial Data page of the AEC website.

Appendix B: Operation of statutory requirements for the making of a redistribution

Section 73 of the Electoral Act requires the augmented Electoral Commission to abide by the following requirements:

- make a determination of the names and boundaries of the electoral divisions in Victoria by a notice published in the Gazette,
- ensure the number of electoral divisions Victoria is divided into equals the number of members of the House of Representatives to be chosen in Victoria at a general election, and
- abide by the following requirements:

(4) In making the determination, the augmented Electoral Commission:

(a) shall, as far as practicable, endeavour to ensure that the number of electors enrolled in each Electoral Division in the State or Territory will not, at the projection time determined under section 63A, be less than 96.5% or more than 103.5% of the average divisional enrolment of that State or Territory at that time; and

(b) subject to paragraph (a), shall give due consideration, in relation to each proposed Electoral Division, to:

(i) community of interests within the proposed Electoral Division, including economic, social and regional interests;

(ii) means of communication and travel within the proposed Electoral Division;

(iv) the physical features and area of the proposed Electoral Division; and

(v) the boundaries of existing Divisions in the State or Territory;

and subject thereto the quota of electors for the State or Territory shall be the basis for the proposed redistribution, and the augmented Electoral Commission may adopt a margin of allowance, to be used whenever necessary, but in no case shall the quota be departed from to a greater extent than one-tenth more or one-tenth less.

(4A) When applying subsection (4), the augmented Electoral Commission must treat the matter in subparagraph (4)(b)(v) as subordinate to the matters in subparagraphs (4)(b)(i), (ii) and (iv).

These statutory requirements are expressed generally in a hierarchical order.

The purpose of paragraph 73(4)(a) is suggested by its history. It has undergone some transformation since the *Commonwealth Electoral Legislation Amendment Act 1983* stipulated that boundaries were to be drawn, as far as practicable, to achieve equal numbers of electors in each of a state's electoral divisions three-and-a-half years after a redistribution. By 1984 'it was observed that the three-and-a-half year rule had in some areas forced the adoption, on purely numerical grounds, of boundaries which took little account of perceived community of interest'.⁹⁸

Therefore, in 1987, the rule was relaxed to permit a measure of tolerance to plus or minus two per cent from average projected enrolment. Subsequently, the Joint Standing Committee on Electoral Matters concluded that:

*the numerical criteria do not allow “due consideration”, in the words of the Act, to be given to the qualitative factors. Rather, the political parties and others attempting to frame electoral boundaries essentially find themselves engaged in a mathematical modelling exercise. In order to relax the enrolment requirements to that extent necessary to allow a realistic degree of flexibility the Committee recommends ... that subsections 66(3)(a) and 73(4)(a) of the Electoral Act be amended, so as to extend the variation from average divisional enrolment allowed three-and-a-half years after a redistribution from two to 3.5 percent.*⁹⁹

The Joint Standing Committee on Electoral Matters also, in the same report, refers to its recommended amendment as one that ‘would maintain substantial restrictions on malapportionment [and] would allow other legitimate policy objectives to be more effectively met’.

Paragraph 73(4)(a) follows this recommendation. The terms of the recommendation, and the discussion which preceded it, make clear the purpose of paragraph 73(4)(a), as it now stands, and how it was intended to interact with the other criteria set out in the sub-paragraphs of paragraph 73(4)(b), to which also ‘due consideration’ must be given. The Redistribution Committee has considered the suggestions and comments and made its proposed redistribution on this basis.

In summary, the primary criteria are to:

- endeavour to ensure that the number of electors in the proposed electoral divisions are within a range of 3.5 per cent below or above the projected enrolment quota at the projection time, and
- ensure that current enrolments are within 10 per cent below or above the redistribution quota.

The secondary criteria are community of interests, means of communication and travel, and physical features and area. The augmented Electoral Commission also considers the boundaries of existing electoral divisions; however this criterion is subordinate to the others.

Appendix H: Constructing electoral division boundaries

The AEC maintains the electoral roll on the basis of alignment to SA1s, and is able to provide data on enrolments and projected enrolments at this level. Accordingly, in formulating its proposals, the augmented Electoral Commission used SA1s as its basic building blocks. The SA1s have defined boundaries and are of differing sizes and shapes. In cases where the augmented Electoral Commission considered that a particular SA1 boundary was inappropriate for use as an electoral division boundary, the SA1 was split to provide a more meaningful boundary.

The indicative area of electoral divisions in Victoria has been calculated by aggregating the area of:

- all land-based SA1s;
- any parts of land-based SA1s; and
- any lakes, ponds, rivers, creeks, wetlands or marshes not already included in land-based SA1s, that are contained within the divisional boundary of each electoral division.

Areas are calculated using the AEC's Electoral Boundary Mapping System (EBMS), developed within the 'MapInfo Professional' software package.

The augmented Electoral Commission used EBMS as an aid to modelling various boundary options.

Appendix I: Announcement of the augmented Electoral Commission's proposed redistribution

The text of the augmented Electoral Commission's public announcement of their proposed redistribution, issued on Tuesday 29 June 2021, is reproduced below.

Names and boundaries of federal electoral divisions in Victoria decided

The augmented Electoral Commission for Victoria today announced the outcome of its deliberations on the names and boundaries of the 39 federal electoral divisions in Victoria.

The Hon. Justice Susan Kenny AM, the presiding member, thanked the individuals and organisations who contributed to the redistribution.

"All written objections and comments, as well as the information presented at the online inquiry, have been carefully considered in deciding the final names and boundaries," Justice Kenny said.

"The augmented Electoral Commission has unanimously agreed to retain the name of the Division of Corangamite and to modify the boundaries of 20 of the electoral divisions initially proposed in March," Justice Kenny said.

"The augmented Electoral Commission has also unanimously accepted the Redistribution Committee's proposed boundary changes to the remaining electoral divisions and the creation of the new Division of Hawke."

As a result of these modifications, fewer electors will change their electoral division. This article contains a brief outline of:

- Electoral division names,
- Electoral division boundaries, and
- Next steps.

Electoral division names

The augmented Electoral Commission has adopted the majority of the names proposed by the Redistribution Committee for Victoria.

The exception is the decision to retain the name of the Division of Corangamite, which was previously proposed to be renamed the Division of Tucker.

Electoral division boundaries

The augmented Electoral Commission has modified the Redistribution Committee's initial redistribution proposal by placing:

- that portion of Berwick located south of Greaves Road and west of Clyde Road in the proposed Division of Bruce
 - the Redistribution Committee had proposed placing this portion of Berwick in the proposed Division of Holt
- the portion of Narre Warren South located east of Narre Warren – Cranbourne Road and north of Glasscocks Road in the proposed Division of Bruce
 - the Redistribution Committee had proposed placing this portion of Narre Warren South in the proposed Division of Holt

- the part of the locality of Burwood East bounded by Burwood Highway, Blackburn Road, Hawthorn Road and Mahoneys Road in the proposed Division of Chisholm, uniting the locality in the one electoral division
 - the Redistribution Committee had proposed transferring this part of Burwood East to the proposed Division of Deakin
- the entirety of the locality of Inverleigh in the proposed Division of Corangamite
 - the Redistribution Committee had proposed splitting this locality across the proposed Divisions of Ballarat and Wannon
- the locality of Hesse and part of the locality of Wingeel in the proposed Division of Corangamite
 - the Redistribution Committee had proposed transferring these areas to the proposed Division of Ballarat
- that portion of the localities of South Yarra and Windsor located to the east of Punt Road and that portion of the locality of Prahran located between Punt Road and Williams Road in the proposed Division of Higgins
 - the Redistribution Committee had proposed placing these areas in the proposed Division of Macnamara
- the entirety of the locality of Clyde and part of the locality of Tooradin in the proposed Division of Holt
 - the Redistribution Committee had proposed transferring these localities to the proposed Division of La Trobe
- that portion of Hampton Park located to the north of Pound Road be located in the proposed Division of Holt
 - the Redistribution Committee had proposed transferring this area to the proposed Division of Bruce
- the residential part of the locality of Lyndhurst, bounded by Western Port Highway, Thompsons Road and the Cranbourne rail line, in the proposed Division of Holt
 - the Redistribution Committee had proposed transferring this part of Lyndhurst to the proposed Division of Isaacs
- the part of the locality of Oakleigh East bounded by the Princes Highway, Ferntree Gully Road and Clayton Road in the proposed Division of Hotham, uniting the locality in the one electoral division
 - the Redistribution Committee had proposed transferring this portion of Oakleigh East to the proposed Division of Chisholm
- the part of the locality of Dandenong, located to the south of the Pakenham-Cranbourne rail line and bounded by Eastlink, the Dandenong Bypass and the South Gippsland Highway, in the proposed Division of Isaacs. As a result of this move and the Lyndhurst move above, the proposed Division of Isaacs is the same as at the commencement of the redistribution
 - the Redistribution Committee had proposed transferring this part of Dandenong to the proposed Division of Bruce

- the portion of the locality of Surrey Hills bounded by Riversdale Road, Elgar Road, Canterbury Road and Warrigal Road in the proposed Division of Kooyong, uniting the locality in the one electoral division
 - the Redistribution Committee had proposed placing this part of Surrey Hills in the proposed Division of Chisholm
- that portion of Berwick located to the east of Harkaway Road and north of High Street/Princes Highway in the proposed Division of La Trobe
 - the Redistribution Committee had proposed placing this portion of Berwick in the proposed Division of Bruce
- that portion of the locality of Harkaway located to the east of Harkaway Road in the proposed Division of La Trobe
 - the Redistribution Committee had proposed placing the locality of Harkaway, in its entirety, in the proposed Division of Bruce
- the entirety of the localities of Caulfield, Caulfield East and Caulfield North, together with that portion of the locality of St Kilda East located to the east of Hotham Street and those portions of the localities of Elsternwick and Glen Huntly located to the north of Glen Huntly Road in the proposed Division of Macnamara. As a result, the proposed Division of Macnamara is the same as at the commencement of the redistribution, except that the majority of the locality of Windsor has been transferred to the proposed Division of Higgins
 - the Redistribution Committee had proposed placing these areas in the proposed Division of Higgins

The augmented Electoral Commission has also made a small number of minor alterations, involving little or no elector movement, to adhere to features or administrative boundaries as a means of providing more easily recognisable electoral division boundaries.

Next steps

The augmented Electoral Commission notes this proposal is not significantly different from the Redistribution Committee's proposal. Therefore, no further input from members of the public will be sought.

The names and boundaries of the federal electoral divisions for Victoria will apply from Monday 26 July 2021 when a notice of determination is published in the Commonwealth Government Notices Gazette. Electoral events will not be contested on these new federal electoral divisions until a writ for a full federal election is issued after the notice of determination is published.

Overview maps will be available on the AEC website on Monday 26 July 2021. Detailed maps and a report outlining the augmented Electoral Commission's reasons for its formal determination will be tabled in the Federal Parliament and will subsequently be made publicly available.

Pursuant to sub-section 73(6) of the Electoral Act, until the next following expiration or dissolution of the House of Representatives the redistribution does not affect the election of a new member to fill a vacancy happening in the House of Representatives.

Appendix L: Guidelines for naming federal electoral divisions

Determining the names of federal electoral divisions is part of the process of conducting a federal redistribution within a state or territory.

The criteria used by redistribution committees to propose the names of electoral divisions, and used by augmented electoral commissions to determine the names of electoral divisions, have previously been the subject of recommendations from the Joint Standing Committee on Electoral Matters. From these recommendations, a set of guidelines were developed as a point of reference only.

It should be noted that redistribution committees and augmented electoral commissions are not bound by the guidelines.

Naming after persons

In the main, electoral divisions should be named after deceased Australians who have rendered outstanding service to their country.

When new electoral divisions are created the names of former Prime Ministers should be considered.

Federation Divisional names

Every effort should be made to retain the names of original federation electoral divisions.

Geographical names

Locality or place names should generally be avoided, but in certain areas the use of geographical features may be appropriate (e.g. Perth).

Aboriginal names

Aboriginal names should be used where appropriate and as far as possible existing Aboriginal divisional names should be retained.

Other criteria

The names of Commonwealth electoral divisions should not duplicate existing state districts.

Qualifying names may be used where appropriate (e.g. Melbourne Ports, Port Adelaide).

Names of electoral divisions should not be changed or transferred to new areas without very strong reasons.

When two or more electoral divisions are partially combined, as far as possible the name of the new electoral division should be that of the old electoral division which had the greatest number of electors within the new boundaries. However, where the socio-demographic nature of the electoral division in question has changed significantly, this should override the numerical formula.

Appendix M: General description of how electoral divisions are constituted

The following tables show how each electoral division has been constructed and are intended to assist electors to identify if their electoral division has been altered as a result of this redistribution.

The unit to display this construction is Statistical Area 2s (SA2s).¹⁰⁰ Each SA2 comprises a number of SA1s. The SA1s and SA2s which applied at the 2016 Census of Population and Housing have been used. Some SA2s will appear multiple times in the following tables as they are not contained within the one electoral division but cover multiple electoral divisions.
