





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Introduction

Overall, I am pleased with the results of this proposal. Given the issue of incorrect elector projections rendered suggestions and comments on suggestions useless, I am pleased to see the results end up as strong as they are. There are few areas I would suggest changing, and I commend the Committee on their achievement.

I will provide an analysis and assessment of each proposed division, rating the proposed divisions on how well they adhere to the criteria specified in section 66(3)(b) of the Electoral Act. Following my analysis, I will present my own suggested changes to the proposed divisions.

Proposed name of new division

I fully support the proposed division name **BULLWINKEL** after Lieutenant Colonel Vivian Bullwinkel Statham AO MBE ARRC ED FNM FRCNA. She is more than worthy as a recipient. Of note, none of the suggestions even mentioned her as a candidate, which maybe reflects what criteria those making suggestions focussed on. I certainly approve of a division named after someone making such a difference, and someone who endured so much. Lt Col Bullwinkel is far more deserving than any politician and I am pleased to see the Committee taking this matter upon themselves to ensure suitable candidates were selected.

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Analysis of proposed divisions

Methodology

I have assessed each proposed division, and subjectively scored against the criteria outlined in the Electoral Act:

- i. community of interests within the proposed electoral division, including economic, social and regional interests,
- ii. means of communication and travel within the proposed electoral division,
- iv. the physical features and area of the proposed electoral division, and
- v. the boundaries of existing electoral divisions in Western Australia, with this factor being subordinate to the consideration of i, ii and iv.

When assessing the proposed division against the criteria, I am specifically looking for the following:

Criterion i: I am looking at whether the proposed division includes like suburbs and neighbourhoods, whether there are isolated parts of suburbs excluded from the division, or a section of a suburb is included and isolated from the remaining of the suburb in another division.

Criterion ii: whether there is sufficient means of effective travel and lines that make sense and allows both the elected member and electors to travel to other communities within the division. In large rural divisions, electors may be widely dispersed, however they should be able to travel along corridors to reach other communities.

Criterion iv: Assessment includes if the proposed division follows natural contours and barriers – such as rivers and mountains – as well as man-made barriers such as freeways, railways or major highways. In addition, assessment includes whether some parts of the division are physically excluded or isolated by natural features. In cases where a community is physically isolated from all other communities, this is not considered as important.

Criterion v: In many cases, the existing boundaries are useful indicators of community. Long established and unchanged boundaries could be indicators of a clear divide in communities. However, the time can come where certain boundaries need to be breached. A reliance on the existing boundaries to the detriment of, or at the expense of, the other criteria will be scored lower.

Furthermore, an additional criterion is assessed based on the general appearance, compactness and cohesiveness of the division. Divisions that are overly elongated, contorted, twisted, or those that stretch across wide areas of unused land to connect communities can lead to lower communities of interest and lines of communication can be impacted.

Additionally, an overly elongated or twisted division is more likely to be subject to accusations of gerrymandering and perceptions that the division may be drawn in such a manner as to gain political advantage by including or excluding certain communities.

I think this is really the only viable solution for BRAND. It does reiterate the issue that occurs when trying to align division and entire LGA boundaries. The suburbs of Secret Harbour, Golden Bay and Karnup are now disconnected from the rest of the community in Rockingham. For this reason, I'd suggest that there is little need to continue to adhere to the LGA boundary as the division boundary to the east.

As a new division this has ideal boundaries and the communities that are included seem coherent and logical. Combining the four wheatbelt LGAs in Toodyay, Northam, York, and Beverley with the outer suburban areas and Darling Range makes for a sensible division. There are only two issues I can identify. The first being using the Canning River and Gosnells Road West as a boundary instead of the stronger barrier in the Tonkin Highway. The second issue is defining part of the boundary along SA1 boundary instead of a more easily identifiable line on the ground.

The proposed division is stretched in a north-south direction in what is too elongated to be a single cohesive division. The inclusion of parts of Serpentine-Jarrahdale LGA while extending to the northernmost point of Gosnells LGA mean this is not the best division it could be. I'd also have preferred to see Canning Vale added to Burt, as it is really distinct from the rest of TANGNEY, as well as being physically separated from the other communities.

The proposed **Canning** is an order of magnitude of an improvement over the existing **Canning**. I am happy to see the disconnected areas in Kalamunda LGA have been removed. The parts in Serpentine-Jarrahdale LGA are still slightly disconnected with no direct road links to the main population centre of Mandurah. However, this a vast improvement over the existing arrangement.

Overall, the proposed COWAN is a reasonable and sensible proposal. I am glad the Committee managed to avoid splitting suburbs in the north and Ocean Reef Road is a logical boundary. The only issue I have is the awkward looking dogleg around Ballajura and Malaga. I would like to see this line straightened, but changes in this area lead to cascading effects in HASLUCK.

The proposed **CURTIN** has no defects and meets all criteria. It is cohesive and confined using strong and logical major roads as boundaries.

In general, the proposed **DURACK** is acceptable and meets the criteria. It is unfortunate that the suburb of Bullsbrook is still included. I could suggest that Bullsbrook be transferred into **HASLUCK**, however this will result in **DURACK** falling below threshold, which could be remedied by transferring all of Toodyay from **BULLWINKEL** to Durack. Whether this change is justified would be a matter for the Augmented Electoral Commission. This is not the issue with

The trend continues that Forrest is now an Indian Ocean facing division instead of a south west focussed division. While I don't feel this is an issue, there may be some concern from communities inland that are connected to the coastal towns. I agree with the general approach to use LGA boundaries in rural areas, however in this case it leads to an overwhelmingly jagged and unwieldly boundary in the east of Dardanup LGA.

The proposed **FREMANTLE** is cohesive and compact. The only issues with perfectly aligning with the LGA boundaries is that future redistributions will likely need to exclude a small part of the LGA, or include a small community from elsewhere to meet future numerical thresholds. This small community would therefore be detached and isolated from the rest of their community.

Overall, this is actually a decent proposal for the division. The awkward dogleg at Malaga, and the exclusion of Bullsbrook are what bring this division down slightly. I'm still unsure why Committees have determined that Lexia and Melaleuca fit better in Pearce than with the remaining communities in the Swan LGA, however, as the number of electors in this area is negligible, I think persisting with the strong boundary of the Tonkin Highway makes sense. It is unfortunate that Bullsbrook cannot be accommodated as part of this division.

The proposed Moore is a sensible division. Gaining everything north of Karrinyup Road from Curtin and using the Mitchell Freeway, the boundaries are clear and strong. The only issue is the communities of Burns Beach and Kinross probably belong in Moore rather than Pearce, and using Burns Beach Road as a boundary, these suburbs become physically separated from the rest of Pearce. However, this is probably the preferred option over breaking up Kingsley and Woodvale or crossing the Mitchell Freeway to the south.

Overall, the proposed division is as good as we can get it. There is some lack of communication methods between the south west and the greater part of the division, and this has probably been exacerbated by the creation of Bullwinkel and moving the LGAs along the Great Eastern Highway into Durack. There will be some concern from residents in the far south west that they identify clearer with the towns in Forrest, but in order to meet the numerical threshold, they must be included in O'CONNOR.

The proposed division of PEARCE is logical and cohesive. I'm still not sure why Lexia and Melaleuca get included here, where they fit better in HASLUCK, but the effect is negligible so I'm willing to concede that point. The suburbs of Burns Beach and Kinross are physically separated from the rest of the division by the Tamala Park Conservation Reserve. But overall, I am happy with their inclusion in PEARCE.

The proposed Perth is a clear and compact division that meets all criteria. Using the Tonkin Highway and Morely Drive/Karrinyup Road leads to clear boundaries and united communities.

I think the proposed division of SWAN is generally acceptable. I think the suburbs of Ferndale, Lynwood and Langford are disconnected from the rest of the division being the only suburbs south of the Canning River. These suburbs have been moved in and out of both SWAN and TANGNEY over the years and it would be good to see some stability in this area. Furthermore, using SA1 boundaries as the division boundary around the airport could result in confusion as electors cannot easily identify where these boundaries are on the ground. I'd prefer to see a boundary using roads or railways in the area especially as the SA1 boundaries in question will probably impact few electors. Finally, I believe that SWAN could have been given the suburbs around Kenwick or Maddington rather than these being included in an elongated BURT.

On the whole this division is sensible and logical. I suggest that the suburbs of Ferndale, Lynwood and Langford fit better in **Tangney** than they do in **Swan**, and utilising the Canning River as the northern boundary makes sense. Excising the distinct and separate Canning Vale would have been an improvement, however, in doing this it would not have been possible to meet the numerical threshold.

Suggested changes to proposed division boundaries


I feel that it is pointless and unhelpful to object without providing an alternative solution, so I feel compelled to contribute some specific suggestions to change the proposed redistribution.

While I am not entirely satisfied with the area around Gosnells and Armadale area, I have not proposed any changes or transfers in this area, as I cannot make the numbers work without resorting to wholesale changes covering the entire area.

I would like to see the dog leg between Cowan and Hasluck removed, just mostly because it's unwieldy and awkward. I tried several solutions to maintain the Tonkin Highway and transfer Noranda and the parts of Morely west of the highway back to Cowan, but nothing worked, without making wholesale changes across multiple divisions. In the end, I think transferring the industrial Malaga, and using the Reid Highway would make for a stronger boundary.

I propose that 5 actual and 4 projected electors in the SA2 of Malaga, proposed to be transferred to HASLUCK, remain within COWAN.

I propose that 0 actual and projected electors in the SA2 of Ballajura proposed to be transferred to HASLUCK, remain within COWAN.



The next suggestion is one that I am at two minds about, but have decided that I might as well at least put it forward for consideration and let the Augmented Committee decide if it is justified. I feel that Bullsbrook really does not belong in a division spanning the entire width and length of the continent, so should be transferred into a more urban division. Alongside that, and to make a straighter border, the sparsely populated part of Swan LGA north of the Tonkin Highway is also transferred out of Pearce and into Hasluck.

However, I realise that transferring Toodyay into **DURACK** and splitting it from Northam seems to be the only realistic way to bring **DURACK** into threshold. I put it forward for the Augmented Committee to determine which of Bullsbrook or Toodyay is a better fit in **DURACK**.

I propose that 4,103 actual and 4,569 projected electors in the SA2 of Bullsbrook proposed to remain in **Durack**, be transferred to **HASLUCK**.

I propose that 0 actual and projected electors in the SA2 of Melaleuca – Lexia, proposed to remain in Durack, be transferred to HASLUCK.

I propose that 2 actual and 1 projected electors in the SA2 of Melaleuca – Lexia, proposed to remain in **PEARCE**, be transferred to **HASLUCK**.

I propose that 0 actual and projected electors in the SA2 of Ellenbrook, proposed to remain in **PEARCE**, be transferred to **HASLUCK**.

I propose that 1 actual and projected elector in the SA2 of Walyunga National Park, proposed to remain in **DURACK**, be transferred to **HASLUCK**.

I propose that 3,565 actual and 3,642 projected electors in the SA2 of Toodyay proposed to be included in **BULLWINKEL**, instead be transferred to **DURACK**.
